Mobile museum to visit Bossard Library

From March 3rd through the 13th, Bossard Library will feature a traveling mobile museum exhibit entitled "Always There: 50 Years of County Boards." This exhibit is being presented by the Gallia County Board of Developmental Disabilities and coincides with the annual Developmental Disabilities (DD) Awareness Month in March. It provides highlights and milestones of the past half century of developmental disability services in Ohio and across the nation.

The mobile museum features eight large pull-up banners depicting six decades of developmental disabilities history from the early 20th century to the present. This museum has been featured at the Ohio Statehouse and has traveled to dozens of counties in Ohio over the past two years.

Historic milestones featured in each decade include the formation of county boards of DD in 1967 as the first locally-organized and funded DD support system in the nation, the deinstitutionalization of Ohio's system for providing DD support. passage of key legislation in the 1970s and 1980s, which expanded the rights of people with disabilities to live in their communities, as well as the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, among others.

This exhibit is free and open to the public during normal library hours and can be viewed in the library's Riverside Room when no other programs are being held. For more information about the DD Mobile History Museum, contact Ellen Rainey at erainey@galliadd.com.

Celebrate Women's Fistory Month

March is Women's History Month and is an annual celebration of the oftenoverlooked impact women have had on history that has been observed each March in the United States since 1987.

The annual celebration of Women's History Month developed from a weeklong celebration of the contributions of women to culture, history, and society first organized in 1978 in a school district in California. By 1980, the idea had caught on, and then President Jimmy Carter issued the first presidential proclamation declaring the week of March 8 as National Women's History Week. Congress followed with their own resolution establishing a national celebration a year later. In 1987, the National Women's History Project successfully petitioned Congress to expand the celebration to the entire month of March.

Gatewood, and O.O. McIntyre, along with events that shaped the city, such as the Silver Bridge Disaster and the Battle of Point Pleasant. Other lesser-known stories about Gallipolis will also be revealed in the film.

Adult Winter Reading continues...

There is still time to sign up for Bossard Library's Adult Winter Reading program and enter your name for a chance to win one of six grand prizes. The program will continue through the end of the day on April 1 and winning names will be drawn for prizes on the afternoon of April 2.

Adult Winter Reading began on January 6, and, as of February 29, there were over 300 adults signed up for the program. This is up from last year's total when 258 people signed up for Adult Winter Reading.

Adults who read five books receive a small prize, and, for every book read, participants will earn a ticket for a chance to win one of five themed baskets or a set of seasonal wreaths. Each "basket" contains items worth between \$85-\$95 and are on display near the circulation desk.

Each participant can receive up to a maximum of 25 tickets, and tickets for books read may be used on as many or as few of the six prizes, so drop as many tickets as you can into the bag for your favorite basket or prize for more chances to win!

Only books and audiobooks borrowed from Bossard Library will count toward prizes in the program. Audiobooks and eBooks borrowed from the Ohio Digital Library and Hoopla are also eligible, as well as books read in conjunction with Bossard Library's Adult Book Club and Civil War Book Club.
